Update from the Chair

AGWSD Equality, Diversity and Inclusion Policy

The GPC agreed the Equality, Diversity and Inclusion Policy (EDI) for the AGWSD at their zoom meeting on 28th November 2020. The policy was written by a working party of members of the GPC who went through a structured process of discussion, sharing thoughts on; what does discrimination and harassment mean, awareness of harassment and discrimination, personal experiences, groups that are more likely to face discrimination and harassment. Followed by, how the AGWSD works at the moment, what we wished to achieve.

Writing the policy focussed on the aims of the AGWSD as found in the Constitution:

The objects of the Association shall be: (i) the preservation and improvement of craftsmanship in hand weaving, spinning and dyeing, for the benefit of the public; (ii) the promotion of public awareness and education in such craftsmanship. What we would do to achieve the aim of making the AGWSD open equally to all, looking at the Code of Conduct already in place.

The following is the agreed EDI Policy:

Equality, Diversity and Inclusivity Policy

This policy covers everyone working for or on behalf of the AGWSD.

The purpose of the AGWSD is:

- i. the preservation and improvement of craftsmanship in hand weaving, spinning and dyeing, for the benefit of the public;
- ii. the promotion of public awareness and education in such craftsmanship.

We will ...

- Work considerately and respectfully with all – respecting diversity, different roles and boundaries, and avoiding giving offence
- Treat everyone with dignity and respect
- Set an example by behaving as you would like to be treated
- Encourage others to challenge constructively any attitudes or behaviours that are not in keeping with the behaviour expected in this policy
- Treat all people as equals

We recognise our legal responsibility under the Equality Act 2010 to ensure that no-one covered by the protected characteristics of the Act is discriminated against.

We will work to implement this policy with everyone involved and the policy will be reviewed annually by the GPC.

AGWSD Exhibition 2022

The AGWSD Exhibition 2022, Coal, Cotton, Canals is back on course for September 2022. Leigh Spinners Mill has a new manager in place, Jo Platt. Communications with her are very positive. Our understanding is that the work continues to create spaces of interest for the various parts of the mill. We have the basis of a team, who were involved with the exhibition prior to the rescheduling. We would very much like a volunteer to take on the role of exhibition convenor, to take this forward. Much work was undertaken for the exhibition before it had to be cancelled for 2020, the convenor will be picking up the reins, to bring about a much waited for exhibition.

AGWSD Guild Gathering

The AGWSD Guild Gathering, convened by Kate Batchelor, is rescheduled for mid June 2022. I remember the disappointment when the Guild Gathering had to be cancelled. I also remember the support given by guild members and the speakers and tutors for rerunning this event in 2022.

Glanffyd Mill

I am a member of the Welsh Mills Society, have been since the eighties when I was doing research into Welsh Mills. I received an email from them about the mill restored by Margaret Bide. Since Margaret's death in 2019, the mill has been sold. It is listed by Cadw, the new owners are looking to make alterations. There is now a consultation period, which has been extended to 7th March. I have written to Cadw, as has Jennie Parry, our President, on behalf of the AGWSD.

All members of Guilds affiliated to the AGWSD, pay an affiliation fee. This covers the public liability insurance, the costs of your guild delegate travelling to and from the AGWSD AGM, it also goes toward the costs of running the AGWSD.

There are so many further benefits from affiliation.

The AGWSD constitution states that we are an educational organisation which promotes public awareness. The biennial events, summer school, conference (Guild Gathering for 2022), and exhibition are open to members, they are also open to the public.

Our three certificates, the Foundation Certificate, the Certificate of Achievement and the Certificate in Advanced Textile Studies are there for guild members to undertake.

The Journal for Weavers, Spinners and Dyers, produced under the banner of the AGWSD, by the Journal Editorial Committee, with each edition full of information and advice, adding to the whole emphasis on education.

Then there is this AGWSD News you are reading, emailed to guild secretaries, roughly monthly, by Charlotte Powell. It is full of information, updates on events, links to interesting exhibitions, conferences, anything textile related, an ongoing communication packed with items of interest.

There is so much on offer for the annual affiliation fee, far more than the very necessary public liability insurance.



Meet the GPC: Christina Chisholm, Summer School 2021 Convenor



I'm not really new to the GPC, as I've been here twice already in a different guise! I served on the JEC from 2009-2019, with two stints as Chair (2012-2014 and 2016-2019), which automatically elected me a member of the GPC and Trustee of the Association.

This time I've returned direct to the GPC for a far larger challenge than I had originally anticipated; remaining positive and moving forward with the organisation of a Summer School in the midst of a pandemic!

I joined the Highland Guild in 2002 as a novice spinner, learnt a great deal from workshops and fellow Guild members, and was Chair from 2005-2009. Since the recession started in 2008, I have enjoyed more time to pursue my textile crafts and take on various responsibilities within the Association.

My learning curve has continued through Certificates of Achievement in Spinning (2015, Distinction), Natural Dyeing (2016, Credit) and Weaving (2017, Distinction) and continues to be fulfilling and enjoyable. I was a Selector for the 2018 National Exhibition, and a tutor at the 2019 Summer School. I particularly enjoy combining spinning, weaving and dyeing in a single project, and exploring colour, pattern and texture. My production is efficient to the extent that I sell mainly handwoven articles worldwide; I don't have sufficient cupboard space!

My other interests include hillwalking, music (piano, organ, flute and clarinet), and I am an external Associate of the London College of Music (Clarinet Performance). I am also a Church of Scotland Elder and organist. It now seems centuries ago, but after University (Cambridge) I qualified (RICS) and practiced as a Chartered Surveyor in the City of London for several years, prior to moving to Ross-shire (Scotland) and setting up in practice with my husband. We ran our own practice for 20 years and also set up and ran a residential development company during this time. Had it not been

for the opportunity for a change of direction created by the recession referred to above, I would probably not have had such fun with textiles over the last decade!
